### Finance Committee

A meeting of the Finance Committee was called to order by Councilor DiNatale on Wednesday, February 22, 2023 at 6:10 PM in the Legislative Building, 700 Main Street, Fitchburg, MA.

Committee Members present: Councilors Paul Beauchemin, Derrick Cruz, Marcus DiNatale, Andrew Van Hazinga, and Anthony Zarrella.

Committee Members absent: None.

The chairman read an announcement regarding the recording of public meetings, noting that FATV was recording and broadcasting the meeting. No other person stated that they were recording the meeting.

The chairman opened the meeting for public comment. No one spoke.

Discussion: The chairman announced that he was taking Orders #041-23, #042-23, and #043-23 together. Human Resources Director Susan Davis, Public Works Commissioner Nick Erickson, and Deputy Water Commissioner John Deline were present. The chairman read the last sentence from the mayor's letter dated February 15, 2023.

Ms. Davis stated that she is very proud of the contract and that there had been a great number of hours invested in the negotiations. This contract will help with labor retention by making rates more competitive. The matrix has added six grades which will give employees an opportunity to move up in grade as they gain additional certifications. Mr. Erickson said the department has struggled in the past to attract employees, especially those that require special licenses. It will especially help in the Water Division. The city is willing to train a workforce, but would prefer to attract talent that is already trained.

Councilors asked why more grades are important. Ms. Davis replied that it allows for steps between old positions. Also some positions in the Water and Wastewater Divisions have license requirements that take longer to get, so the new matrix reflects that fact. Councilors asked if the city is paying for training. Mr. Erickson replied that the Commonwealth is now requiring class time for a CDL license, so the city will front the money for employees to get that training. The cost is about \$5,000 to \$6,000 per person. It is important to have as many employees as possible with CDL and Hoisting licenses.

Councilors asked about the cost of living increases (COLA). Ms. Davis said the contract includes COLA's of 0%, 1%, and 2%. The zero first year is because all employees have been reassigned to a new matrix with increases based on training. Councilors did continue to express approval of the contract and asked some specific questions about particular parts of the contract.

Action: On a motion made by Councilor Beauchemin second by Councilor Zarrella, the committee voted unanimously to approve Orders #041-23, #042-23, and #043-23.

ORDER: that the City of Fitchburg hereby approves the expenditure of funds from the MassDevelopment, Brownfields Site Remediation Grant in the approximate amount of \$250,000.00 (TWO HUNDRED FIFTY THOUSAND AND 00/100 DOLLARS) for the purpose of said grant, which is to remediate soil contamination at 80 Lunenburg Street.

Discussion: Director of Community Development Liz Murphy was present. She reported that this grant will be used to clean the property at 80 Lunenburg Street, which currently has a party interested in acquiring and developing it.

Councilors asked if the developer had responsibility to clean the property. Ms. Murphy replied that the grant was awarded after deadline for proposals and that having the city clean the property would make things easier for the new owner. Given that the developer is building affordable housing, it is unlikely that he will substantially profit by the city engaging in clean-up work.

Action: On a motion made by Councilor Zarrella second by Councilor Van Hazinga, the committee voted unanimously to approve Order #044-23.

COMMUNICATION: Mayor Stephen L. DiNatale regarding the Year 49 Community Development Block Grant budget.

Discussion: Ms. Murphy remained. Councilors asked about the process to develop a budget and present to City Council. City Auditor Calvin Brooks explained that the budget is put together by the Community Development Department with input from the Planning Board. It then goes to the mayor for submission to City Council. Per Massachusetts General Law, the mayor must originate all spending requests. City Council then acts and returns the request to the mayor for his signature. Ms. Murphy added that spending on Public Services can not exceed 15% of the total and Administration costs can not exceed 20%.

The chairman then read a letter from the mayor dated February 21, 2023. He then explained that he would take up the budget by category.

<u>Public Facilities and Improvements—5 projects totaling \$294,000.</u> The chairman listed the five projects. Councilors asked about the projects from last year. Ms. Murphy answered that some money is still available, although the construction season is just beginning and those funds are expected to be spent. Councilors asked about sidewalk repairs and were told that funds are being directed more toward curb-cuts.

Action: On a motion made by Councilor Zarrella second by Councilor Van Hazinga, the committee voted unanimously to approve the Public Faculties and Improvements budget.

<u>Public Services—9 projects totaling \$143,400.</u> The chairman listed the nine projects and indicated that he will recuse himself from item N-Transportation to Full STEAM Ahead After School Program. Councilors noted that the majority of projects were a continuation of programs from the past. Ms. Murphy noted that two projects are new—Mayor's Energy Fund and Access to Recovery. Because this budget is effective July 1<sup>st</sup>, the projects are for the next year. Several projects were discussed and Police Chief Ernest Martineau spoke on the Drug Enforcement Patrol Program.

Action: On a motion made by Councilor Van Hazinga second by Councilor Beauchemin, the committee voted unanimously to approve the Public Services budget except for item N.

The chairman left the room and Councilor Zarrella took the chair. He then read the description of project N. Councilors asked how many students are transported and Ms. Murphy indicated about 100.

Action: On a motion made by Councilor Cruz second by Councilor Van Hazinga, the committee voted unanimously to approve project N-Transportation to Full STEAM Ahead After School Program.

The chairman returned to the meeting and took the chair.

<u>Economic Development—5 projects totaling \$160,000.</u> The chairman read a list of the projects. Councilors expressed their approval and thanked the administration for continuing to fund small business development. Councilors expressed approval of the Fitchburg Public Market. Joe Ferguson of InTown Fitchburg addressed this incubator project which is similar to a model used in Worcester. Councilors also noted the return of the sign and façade program. Ms. Murphy said they had taken five or six years off and have several businesses they are currently working with.

Action: On a motion made by Councilor Cruz second by Councilor Van Hazinga, the committee voted unanimously to approve the Economic Development budget, excluding W-Fitchburg Downtown Coordinator.

Councilors questioned the need for a downtown coordinator given that the city has an economic development director. Councilors responded that the economic development director has other responsibilities and working on downtown coordinator responsibilities would not be a good use of her time.

Action: On a motion made by Councilor Van Hazinga second by Councilor Cruz, the committee voted 4 to 1 to approve project W-Fitchburg Downtown Coordinator with Councilor Beauchemin in opposition.

Rehabilitation and Restoration—2 projects totaling \$116,000. Councilors noted there is not a lot of funding for these items. Ms. Murphy replied that they utilize other sources of funding and volunteer workforce. It is for fixing small problems. The new ordinance on code enforcement has helped to generate more projects.

Action: On a motion made by Councilor Van Hazinga second by Councilor Beauchemin, the committee voted unanimously to approve the Rehabilitation and Restoration budget.

<u>Demolition/Clearance—1 project totaling \$84,253.54.</u> Ms. Murphy said that they are working on a list. The number of properties will depend on the size and complexity of each project.

Action: On a motion made by Councilor Zarrella second by Councilor Van Hazinga, the committee voted unanimously to approve the Demolition/Clearance budget.

Administration—1 project totaling \$191,317. Ms. Murphy said that this amount covers the full salary of the administrator, part of the salary of the manager and the fiscal agent, and a small portion of the housing director and the community development director.

Action: On a motion made by Councilor Van Hazinga second by Councilor Zarrella, the committee voted unanimously to approve the Administration budget.

On a motion made by Councilor Zarrella second by Councilor Cruz, the committee voted unanimously to adjourn.

The meeting adjourned at 8:35 PM.


